According to NPRCRTC Director Cynthia G. Kiswa, purple yam is an emerging international trend in the food industry with its distinctive purple color and starchy flavor.

Further, it plays a pivotal role in ensuring food security, serving as a cash crop, and generating employment opportunities in areas where it is cultivated and processed.

"Upon completion of the training, participants will gain insights into improved technology for propagating high-quality planting materials of preferred ube varieties," she said.

In his message, CHED-CAR Director Demetrio P. Anduyan Jr. expressed his commendable approval of the event, promising CHED-CAR's steadfast commitment to Benguet State University in the advancement of knowledge and skills in agricultural and production practices.

Assistant II Sheinly B. Balacay-Amcay, took turns expounding on Republic Act No. 7877 known as "Anti-Sexual Harassment Act of 1995," Republic Act No. 11313 known as "Safe Spaces Act," and the Republic Act No. 9262 known as "Violence Against Women and their Children Act of 2004." Specifically, provisions, penalties, and prescription dates

on each case classification were tackled by the speakers.

According to Basco, while the number of charges on gender-based violence cases is on the rise, this can also be a good indicator that more people are becoming aware and well-versed in their legal rights and privileges, thus giving them courage to pursue legal actions against such cases.

In their remarks, GAD-TWG members Marlon S. Tabdi and Amelia M. Kimeu thanked the speakers for enthusiastically sharing their knowledge. Benguet State University through the International Relations Office (IRO) spearheaded the Passport on Wheels activity on February 1 and 2, 2024 at the BSU Gymnasium. This event, in collaboration with the La Trinidad Local Government Unit (LGU) and Department of Foreign Affairs (DFA) ASEANA, was part of the activities in celebration of the University's 38th Charter Anniversary. A total of 803 university staff, faculty, students, and residents of La Trinidad availed of the passport services.

A pre-registration phase was conducted from January 12 to 26, 2024, managed by the IRO. On the first day of pre-registration, La Trinidad Municipal Mayor Romeo K. Salda and BSU President Felipe Salaing Comila personally visited the site. IRO Director Maria Luz D. Fang-asan hosted the distinguished guests, providing a detailed briefing on the process. Concluding the first day with 240 applicants from the BSU community. In the following days, the service was extended to cater to La Trinidad residents.

After the pre-registration phase, a data collection activity facilitated by the DFA was held on February 1-2, 2024. An opening program was conducted attended by La Trinidad Mayor, Hon. Romeo K. Salda, the University President and the applicants. In her address, IRO Director Maria Luz Fang-asan shed light on the underlying motivations behind the initiative. Over the past three years, the IRO noted numerous employees and students that faced

challenges in obtaining passports for international travel due to time constraints. To address this, the office envisioned bringing the service closer to the BSU community. A survey conducted in September 2023 revealed that 1,873 students and 170 employees are interested to avail of the Passport on Wheels service.

Despite initial challenges with the DFA, which implied that the service were limited to LGUs and not universities, the IRO collaborated with the La Trinidad LGU. The effort resulted to the approval of the request, turning the Passport on Wheels initiative into a reality.

The Passport on Wheels, which catered to applicants for new passports and renewal of passports, saved valuable time for employees, students and La Trinidad residents. With 346 applicants on the first day and 457 on the second, the two-day event culminated with a total of 803 successful applications. // GBPalberas-IRO

reminded the participants that various root crops like ube, sustained our forefathers who settled in the mountainous regions of the Cordilleras, during the war, and at the peak of the COVID-19 Pandemic.

Anduvan also expressed his concern on the gradual decline of young people who wanted to venture into agriculture because of two major reasons: that they can't see it as a viable livelihood that leads to overall life improvement, and that the current challenges faced by farmers such as oversupply leads to food waste without profit.

"It is high time for us to make agriculture sexy, enthusing, and interesting so that the younger generation will go back to farming and be proud of farming as a profession because of its dignity to bring food to every person in every home," he challenged.

As for the latter, Anduyan expressed his expectation for Benguet State University along with the other CAR State Universities and Colleges (SUCs) to continue the path of discovering innovations for food production to prevent wasted farmers' produce from going to waste.

"SUCs must be at the forefront in addressing all of these problems because you are the knowledge and technology production centers in your areas," he said.

During the closing program, the participants

expressed gratitude to the training organizers and the resource persons and shared their insights gained throughout the event.

Juliet Damsa, a first-time trainee of purple yam production, recognized the significance and impact of yam cultivation.

Damsa also shared that the activity provided an opportunity for the participants to develop research topics related to purple yam, emphasizing it would contribute to the


improvement and increased yield of purple yam.

recognized research hub that is not only confined within the province.

"I wish to see the day when our bodies of research here in the university will soon be making an impact on the international arena where people from around the world would also benefit from our findings," he said.

To achieve this, the new vice president specified some of his strategic undertakings in the coming years which include collaboration, linkages, and full-fledged support for the university researchers among others.

On points of partnership and linkages, VP Lumbres encouraged his fellow researchers and extensionists to capitalize on outside-funded projects and other available resources outside the university as observations concluded a decline in this area.

He further explained the necessity of collaboration for crafting relevant and timely policies to address current issues and mitigate future challenges. Additionally, he plans to focus on creating an inclusive and nurturing environment as part of the university's research culture that fosters growth and excellence. This encompasses a "good support system" including state-of-the-art facilities, laboratories, and new methodologies among others.

VP Lumbres shared, "We need to capacitate our researchers, both faculty members and non-teaching personnel. We need to link them to the right people and right institutions."

One of his advocacies also highlights initiatives to support people from the university possessing promising potential as agents for positive and impactful changes and development to be sent for their international studies.

"Our researchers need to study outside BSU. In this way, we can adapt whatever existing knowledge and technologies they have. We will then try to calibrate it according to our structure and setup," he added.

When asked about the true goal of research, VP Lumbres expressed, "Definitely, it's to help humanity. For instance, it helps to minimize environmental degradation. In the social aspect, we contribute to the preservation of the indigenous people's knowledge. Then of course, on the business side, the end goal is to commercialize our maturing technologies which can help our farmers increase their profit and spend lesser cost on their inputs."

On another note, the vice president emphasized the imperative role of a clear

vision along with a good moral, a good name, and a good foresight in leading such a big sector. According to him, achieving well-organized steps towards development requires a holistic approach.

While admitting that the vice presidency is a daunting position, VP Lumbres expressed optimism and enthusiasm for the future.

"Since the research and development sector plays some of the biggest roles in the university, it brings much pressure right now... Compared to the former vice presidents, I am relatively younger by experience. But at the same time, I am happy to see that the sector also has a lot of space left for improvement and its potential in terms of development for the university," he answered.

Prior to his appointment, Roscinto lan Lumbres bagged various awards and recognition in the field of research and extension from various agencies and universities.

One of the most noteworthy in recent remembrance is his 'Outstanding Young Scientist 2022' award by CHED. He was also recognized as an 'Outstanding Extensionist' and 'Outstanding Thesis Adviser' at the BSU 107th Foundation Anniversary last December 2023. // CANapiloy
